## Votes Database

#### Journal approval votes

Members of the House have the right to ask for a vote on the Speaker's approval of the <u>House Journal</u>, an official log of activities that is separate from the Congressional Record. Journal approval votes often are used to force lawmakers to come to the House floor, where leadership can check for absentees, or as a delaying tactic. The failure of a Journal approval vote is extremely rare, although a number of lawmakers from the minority party often vote against the Journal's approval.
